His unwavering work ethic and commitment to excellence have left an indelible mark on the business landscape, transforming the lives of countless employees.

Beyond his professional achievements, Patrick was known for his zest for life. He had a passion for knowledge and was an avid news junkie and always had a newspaper in his hand, keeping up with the world's happenings with remarkable curiosity. He also found solace and joy on the golf course. He and Loretta spent many wonderful years in Naples, Florida, perfecting their swing and enjoying the sunshine.

His fondness for the classics extended to his love of Frank Sinatra and the timeless sophistication of gin martinis. A true Yankee fan, he will always be remembered using his Louisville Slugger cane to illustrate his strong opinions!

Patrick's life was a testament to resilience, ambition and dedication to family. He is survived by his loving son and daughter in law, John and Clare Conforti, their children Patrick (Leigh) Conforti, John (Lori) Conforti and Mary Ellen (Marty) Meehan. Patrick was celebrated by his seven Great Grandchildren: Emma and Nicholas (John and Lori), Julia and Nate (Patrick and Leigh) and Lucy, Maggie & Janie (Mary Ellen and Marty). Students Learn About Learning Differences

Kerry Magro, an autistic speaker and author, recently spoke to the Newark Academy student body about the exceptional abilities of individuals with autism diagnoses; the prevalence of bullying; and the importance of disability acceptance.

"Learning differences or accommodations aren't a label, but part of your unique tool kit in this diverse and vibrant world," Magro said. "Every mind is a universe of thoughts and every individual, a world of possibilities. Your differences are not just to be accepted, they are to be celebrated."

He also provided students with strategies for both self-advocacy and being allies and friends to those with disabilities.

After the presentation, students continued the discussion in a breakout session with Magro.

When students who might have learning differences see others like themselves who are thriving, and understand that they are not alone in their struggles, "they learn to advocate for themselves," said Newark Academy director of equity and inclusion Rochelle Outlaw Edwards. "For our students who we might describe as neurotypical, I hope that they learned how to be better allies and friends to those in the disabled community."

Magro is an autism consultant to several TV series, including HBO's "Mrs. Fletcher," and Netflix's "Love on the Spectrum U.S."

He has spoken at numerous events, including two TEDx Talks, and is chief executive officer and president of KFM Making A Difference, a non-profit organization that hosts inclusion events and provides college scholarships for students with autism.
